Theodore Roosevelt Carrier Strike Group scheduled to deploy

SAN DIEGO - USS *Theodore Roosevelt* (CVN 71) and guided-missile cruiser USS *Bunker Hill* (CG 52) are scheduled to depart San Diego for a regularly-scheduled deployment Oct. 6.

Theodore Roosevelt, the flagship of Carrier Strike Group (CSG) 9, and Bunker Hill will join USS Halsey (DDG 97), USS Sampson (DDG 102) and USS Preble (DDG 88) for a routine deployment. The Theodore Roosevelt Carrier Strike Group deployment is an example of the Navy's routine presence in waters around the globe displaying our commitment to stability, regional cooperation and economic prosperity for all nations.

"The U.S. Navy carrier strike group is the most versatile, capable force at sea," said Rear Adm. Steve Koehler, commander, CSG 9. "After nearly a year of training and integration exercises, the entire team is ready as a warfighting force and ready to carry out the nation's tasking."

"I have every confidence the Sailors aboard *Bunker Hill* will carry out their duty meritoriously," said Capt. Joe Cahill, *Bunker Hill*'s commanding officer. "We have trained for this, and we are ready to go."

Theodore Roosevelt will embark aviation squadrons of Carrier Air Wing 17, including squadrons from NAS Lemoore, MCAS Beaufort, S.C., NAS Whidbey Island, Wash., NAS Point Mugu and NAS North Island.

Theodore Roosevelt will also embark the staff of Destroyer Squadron 23.

AMC commander seeks enhanced problem-solving with airlines

SCOTT AIR FORCE BASE, Ill. - The commander of Air Mobility Command spoke with a group of more than 150 airline representatives, Sept. 26, 2017, to address pilot qualification and retention issues common to the Air Force and the airline

Gen. Carlton D. Everhart II delivered the keynote address for the Regional Airlines Association Annual Convention at the Palm Beach County Convention Center in Florida. In addition, Everhart participated in smaller group discussion with the RAA Board of Directors during the event, which brought together executives from 15 separate regional airlines.

"There is great value in having a two-way, active discussion with industry representatives because getting after the pilot retention problem requires us to understand what the airlines are concerned about, just as we want them to see things from our perspective," Everhart said.

The general received feedback on the airlines' need for increased schedule predictability for pilots serving in the Air Reserve Component while highlighting the broad and continuing nature of Air Force and mobility operations

discussed leveraging technology and addressing policy related to building qualified pilots, and further crystallized ways to work together on solutions to the Air Force's pilot retention issues that also consider the industry's need for qualified professional aviators like those with military background.

"One airline received a request to make 45 of his pilots available for duty - which created an unmanageable business strain. This is why we are working to better set requirements and schedules working toward a goal of at least 60 days in advance and examining non-flying deployments through the lens of necessity," the general said. "I did emphasize that we will look to improve in this area, but the world always has a vote. The recent string of hurricanes and the earthquake in Mexico may require reaching out short-notice for support. It is important (that) this is also understood."

Developing a larger pool of qualified pilots was discussed as a foundational necessity to building a better future scenario that can sustain the airline industry and military's need for professional aviators.

The airline executives and the AMC commander talked about ways to enhance educational

quality and opportunities, particularly in schools near military installations. They collectively identified the need to partner in ways to reach students and inspire a passion for aviation and aviation maintenance as viable and exciting career choices.

Everhart spoke to the group about the developing concept of establishing a National Training Academy with military and civilian tracks for attendees. Such an institution would enhance the supply chain of pilots, addressing the shallow pool that currently contributes to competing for those resources between the Air Force and industry.

"Right now, we're starting

with full implementation around the end of 2021."

The aviation industry representatives expressed a primary area of concern in that currently, there is a government-mandated 1,500-hour flight requirement for commercial airline pilots that cannot account for simulator time as flight hours. The sizable expense associated with accumulating the 1,500 in-cockpit flight hours makes the military a recruiting hotbed for the airlines. Because Air Force pilot training includes full motion simulators to better challenge and prepare pilots for a wide variety of situations and developments too risky to replicate in the air, the Air Force's practices and use of this technology could serve as a beacon to demonstrate effectiveness.

Everhart said the ongoing dialogue represented by participating in this conference is essential

to addressing the ongoing challenges the Mobility Air Forces face in attracting, developing and retaining qualified pilots, while working with industry on solutions that will reduce the need to compete over the scarce resource of professional aviators that currently exists.

'Just as we have asked our Airmen for input on what we can do better for them and their families to convince them to stay with us in the service, we continue to talk with industry representatives to fully understand what keeps them up at night," Everhart said. "There is no one easy solution to addressing our pilot shortage. Getting this right is absolutely critical and means looking at all angles of the issue. What can we collectively do to retain our pilots and maintainers, expand the pool of eligibles and reduce the need to compete for talent with the airline industry? It's a shared problem. And it will require a shared solution.

he cyber threat is real

WASHINGTON - Throughout National Cybersecurity Awareness Month this October, and in subsequent articles, the Office of the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Information Warfare will describe the things you can do, at home and at work, to protect yourself and the Navy from cyber threats.

Few people today need to be convinced that our networks, computers and smart phones are at risk of compromise. We've grown accustomed to the news of computer hacks.

The confidential information of 143 million Americans was potentially compromised in the recent Equifax breech. In May 2017, the WannaCry ransomware attack infected 150,000-plus computers in over 150 countries within the first 24 hours

If you keep up with the news, you know of Russia's electionfocused data thefts and disclosures. More distant high profile attacks, such as the 2015 Office of Personnel Management hack that resulted in the theft of 21.5 million personnel records, are memorable because they affected many of us in the Navy.

From these example hacks, you can safely assume anything connected to the internet is at

In fact, any electronic device for storing and processing data a computer - is at risk, regardless of whether it's connected to the internet or whether it looks like the desktop or laptop computers we use at home and at work.

Disconnected systems are also vulnerable as attackers have employed innovative tactics to reach systems not connected to the internet. For example, thumb drives loaded with damaging software were picked up by unsuspecting technicians

and used to spread the Stuxnet virus to centrifuges in an underground Iranian nuclear research facility.

Although the compromise of Iran's nuclear facility was well publicized, less well known are other news reports that also demonstrate physical systems controlled by computers (control systems) are at risk.

In 2016, hackers who were thought to be from Russia com-

system erroneously located the ship at an airport 32 kilometers inland. At least 20 other ships in the area had similar problems with their Automatic Identification System, which U.S. Navy ships also use. "Experts think this is the first documented use of GPS misdirection - a spoofing attack that has long been warned of but never seen in the wild."

BAHRAIN - Rear Adm. Jesse A. Wilson, Jr., commander, Naval Surface Force Atlantic, participated in a ceremony to recognize the establishment of commander, Naval Surface Squadron 5 at Naval Support Activity Bahrain, Oct. 1.

Patrol Coastal Squadron 1 was renamed to reflect the expanded responsibilities and mission of the squadron. Since 2013, PCRON 1 has exercised administrative and operational control of 10 Cyclone-class coastal patrol ships forward-deployed to Bahrain.

In an initiative to execute administrative control over forces assigned to oversee the Title 10 "man, train, equip, and maintain" functions for the PC and mine countermeasure (MCM) ships in Bahrain, PCRON 1 was merged with Mine Countermeasures Squadron 3 Maintenance Detachment and officially renamed. As CNSS 5, the organization will have administrative control of not only the 10 PC ships, but four Avenger-class MCM ships operating out of Bahrain. Additionally, CNSS 5 will provide support to Littoral Combat Ship Squadron ships when they ar-

Like the Ukrainian control systems and the systems controlling the New York dam, Navy control systems and networks used by operational forces could also be at risk of compromise.

Hyten: U.S. Strategic Command is reorganizing for 21st Century warfighting

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2, 2017

— The commander of U.S. Strategic Command is reorganizing to improve its warfighting structure.

Air Force Gen. John E. Hyten told the Air Force Association's Air, Space and Cyber Conference recently that he recognized there was an organizational mismatch on Nov. 3, the day he took command.

He signed out the implementation order in June, and the new air component went live yesterday.

"Even though we're listed as a functional combatant command in the Unified Command Plan," Hyten told the audience, "Stratcom is the ultimate warfighting command. It is our nation's ultimate power. And it is a warfighting command from beginning to end."

The first time he sat down in the Dougherty Conference Center at Offutt Air Force Base, Neb., to meet with his commanders, Hyten said, he saw that the two- and three-star commanders had a speaking role, but not the four-star commanders at the table

That, Hyten said, was because

the four-stars were not operational components to Stratcom. Instead, the two- and threestars were commanders of operational Stratcom components, and they all also worked for the four-stars.

"So I just asked myself, why aren't they [the four stars] the components, and I'll just ask them and they can reach out to the guys that already work for them and fix the problem?" Hyten said he thought at the time. "... How come we aren't organized as a warfighting command?"

Hyten said the only integration happening at Stratcom at the time was in his office.

"Our mission is to provide tailored nuclear, space, cyber,

its own stovepipe. Even nuclear and global strike, in many cases, are stovepiped off each other," the general said. "So the vision of my command is one team, one warfighting team, innovative and joint, providing the integrated multidomain combat capabilities that we need as a nation."

On June 16, Hyten signed an implementation plan to restructure Stratcom's component commands, Air Force Maj. Brian L. Maguire, Stratcom's chief of media operations, said this week. The restructure plan identified four operational components, he said: • A Joint Force Air Component Commander, or JFACC; • A Joint Force Space Component Commander, or JFSCC; • A Joint Force Maritime Component Commander, or JFMCC; and • A Joint Functional Component

Maguire also said JFCC IMD, one of the legacy structures from the previous organization of Stratcom, will remain until the conclusion of the Ballistic Missile Defense Review. Upon conclusion of the review, JFCC IMD will be restructured if and as directed. U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command commander will retain command JFCC IMD.

Standup of the JFACC, JF-SCC and JFMCC, and their assumption of the Nuclear Task Force/Joint Functional Component Command roles and responsibilities is a phased process, Maguire said, to make sure Stratcom has identified and can work through issues while maintaining command and control of the nation's strategic forces

As the JFACC reached initial operating capability Sept. 30, Maguire said, Gen. Robin Rand, as AFGSC commander, will be responsible to Hyten for recommending proper use of assigned and joint attached air forces, and will make those forces available for tasking. He will also plan and coordinate air operations, Maguire said.

Forces available to Rand previously fell under Task Force 204, strategic bomber and reconnaissance aircraft; Task Force 214, land-based intercontinental ballistic missiles; and Task Force 294, aerial refueling tankers, Maguire added.

global strike, electronic warfare, missile defense and intelligence capabilities. That's what the UCP tells us to do, and we do that. But today we do every one of those in Command for Integrated Missile Defense, or JFCC IMD.

Maguire said the plan identifies Air Force Global Strike Command's commander as the JFACC, Air Force Space Command's commander as the JFSCC, and the commander of U.S. Fleet Forces Command as the JFMCC.

Unified coordination group addressing Puerto Rico recovery, governor says

WASHINGTON - Puerto Rican and federal officials are working as a unified coordination group and progress is being made in all lines of effort on the island, but Hurricane Maria's

devastation was so extreme and widespread that the island remains in emergency mode, Gov. Ricardo Rossello said in San Juan Oct 2..

Government and nongovernmental agencies are working together to deliver food, water and fuel to people throughout the island commonwealth, he said.

Progress is being made in all lines of effort, the governor stressed, but he acknowledged that much more needs to hap-

pen. His government is working "effectively with [the Federal Emercency Management Agency] and the Department of Defense, who are helping extensively with all of the logistics and the efforts we have on the ground," he said.

About 7,200 service members of all services and components are on the ground in P.R., the governor said, employed in areas such as transportation, security, fuel units and medical efforts.

Army Lt. Gen. Jeffrey Buchanan, the U.S. Northern Command representative on the island and DoD's liaison to the FEMA-led effort, told National Public Radio that Puerto Rico has received everything he has asked for from Northcom and DoD.

USS *Wasp*, with three embarked helicopters and 10 additional aircraft, will arrive tomorrow. Eight Marine Corps Ospreys and two Hercules transport planes also will deploy to the island.

Hospital ship USNS *Comfort* is in Puerto Rico. The Military Sealift Command ship is crewed with 800 medical personnel and support staff to support 250 patient beds. The ship will fall in on a medical system that is recovering from the storm. The governor said that assessments of the hospital system are complete and that 10 hospitals are back on the electrical grid, with others operating via generators. FEMA officials have worked up a fuel distribution system to ensure uninterrupted electricity at those facilities, Rossello said.

Fuel is a major and necessary commodity. More than 759 of 1,120 retail gas stations have reopened, and waiting times for gas and diesel fuel have dropped drastically, he added, and about 65 percent of large grocery and big-box stores have reopened.

Social Security Matters

Bend points & means testing

Dear Rusty: I was having coffee with several of my neighbors, and the long-term financial health of Social Security came up. With all of the media coverage of the program running out of reserves

in a few years, the issue of "means testing" for benefits came up as a partial solution to the forecasted shortfall. This sounds to me like something that should be considered, but then somebody mentioned that Social Security is already means tested, and he



mentioned taxation and something called "bend points." I'm really confused. Can you explain? Signed: Mixed up

Dear Mixed: Wow, you and your neighbors get into some pretty deep topics over coffee, but let me try to clarify. At its most basic level, a means test is "a determination of whether an individual or family is eligible for government assistance, based upon whether the individual or family possesses the means to do without that help" (Wikipedia definition). With this basic definition, it can't really be said that Social Security is "means tested" in a formal sense. Individuals and families with levels of wealth and income far above average levels can - and do - qualify and receive Social Security benefits based on their contributions to the program during their working years.

But realistically, the calculation of actual benefits does take into account wealth and earnings, at least indirectly. This is where the "bend points" your friend mentioned come into play. The determination of an eligible recipient's Social Security monthly benefit (referred to as the "Primary Insurance Amount" or PIA) involves a three step process:

- 1. The indexing of recorded earnings for a 35-year period. Using the highest recorded earnings, each annual figure is indexed to bring the amount up to current values. This is done using a set of annual percentages developed by the Social Security Administration to reflect present values of those earnings.
- 2. A monthly average for the 35-year period is then calculated. After indexing, the average monthly earnings amount for the 35year period is separated into three levels, called bend points, this way (dollar values for 2017): a. the first \$885 is multiplied by 90 percent; b. earnings between \$885 and \$3,556 are multiplied by 32 percent; and c. earnings above \$3,556 are multiplied by 15 percent.

The three amounts calculated in the preceding step are added together to determine the PIA.

3. Here's an example, assuming a 35-year monthly earnings average of \$5,000: Bend point 1 = \$796.50 (\$885 X 90 percent); Bend point 2 = 854.72 (\$3556 - 885 = \$2671. \$2671 X 32 percent \$854.72); Bend point 3 = 216.60 (\$5000 - 3556 = \$1444. \$1444 X 15 percent = \$216.60)

The Primary Insurance Amount, or PIA, comes to \$1,867 (Monthly amount is always rounded down to the nearest dollar)

I know these computations can be mind-numbing, but the example above illustrates that higher earnings get a lower weighting in determining PIA ... not necessarily a "means test," but a way of ensuring that low wage earners receive a higher return on their Social Security investment. So although true means testing isn't currently a factor in deciding a person's benefit, weighting the bend point percentages higher for the lower dollar portions in the calculation does, in fact, have the effect of being somewhat less favorable to those with a higher average monthly earnings. By the same token, the fact that people with higher adjusted gross incomes can find up to 85 percent of their Social Security subject to taxation also serves to balance the scales more toward lower income earners. I'll take my coffee with cream, and no sugar, please.


San Diego to celebrate unity

INTERPERSONAL EDGE: The engine that drives success |

Q. Is there one critical factor that differentiates those who reach their goals from those who don't? I read a lot of books on success, but I find most of the advice doesn't work for me. Maybe I am just doing these techniques wrong. What is the real engine that drives success?

A. The real engine that drives success is when a person's emotional unconscious and intellect are aligned. This is much harder than it sounds!

Native American elders usually ran the decision-making in many tribes. The interesting part of their management philosophy is that everyone in the group had to agree with a decision or the debate continued. Could you imagine the frozen nature of our government if we had the same rule?

The wisdom in this philosophy is that, in a group of wise people, one dissenting voice has an important point to understand before making the decision. Notice I said a group of wise people. In a group of foolish people, a dissenting voice is probably useless. The extensive conversation between elders allowed valuable information to come to light, thus decision making improved.

You might be surprised to learn that you also contain a mul-

tiplicity of wise selves within your single body. Just listen to yourself during the day and hear how often you have dissenting opinions. There is the one that wants to lose weight and the one that wants the donut. There's the one that wants who wants to take a risk and the one that wants to play it safe.

If you pay attention to yourself you'll notice you spend much of your day simply arguing with yourself. The reason we argue much of ourselves is our conscious intellect runs our life and throws the rest of us into the back seat ignoring their input.

The trouble is these ignored selves don't simply go away. Unconscious emotional selves operate outside of our awareness sabotaging our success. The idea that the road to hell is paved with good intentions is because of these selves. They will only be silent for so long and then they jump up and we drink too much, flirt with the wrong people or yell at our boss. Note that this isn't a "will power" issue!

I wrote the first third of my book dealing with the relationship with ourselves because highly successful people realize this is the first relationship that needs to be addressed. Your effectiveness in all other relationships requires you to be aware of everything unconscious and conscious going on inside of yourself. From my Sunday school days I remember the bible quote, "If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand." Neither can a divided self.

Next time you are arguing with yourself, listen or write down all sides of the argument. Stop siding only with the voices that make you comfortable. Stop judging the voices you don't like.

If you are angry, be angry. Consider that this voice is trying to get you to take a risk. If you are sad, be sad. Consider that this voice is trying to get you to let go of old ways of operating. If you are scared, be scared, and consider that this voice is trying to get you to be proactive.

Each voice inside you has a point. They all need a seat at your tribal table. I find that the voices that make us most uncomfortable are often the voices we most need to hear from. Don't confuse listening to these voices with opening your mouth and saying everything you feel. You'll just blow up your effectiveness. Instead listen to what you deeply need and put together a strategy to get that goal.

Emotions are truly the engine

that drives success. Don't think all those techniques that rely on the intellect alone will get you anywhere. You aren't doing those techniques wrong, but nothing works that doesn't address the heart first. Once you develop an awareness of those voices you previously ignored, your goals will be clear and your intellect can backfill with a strategy that will work!

And the very best part is you will no longer be a house divided but a house unified. The peace, effectiveness and power of internal unity is a pearl of great value in and out of your workplace. And the only cost is to completely get to know the one person you'll never escape - yourself!

Q. I'm an avid reader of your column but find it is truly hard to apply what you are teaching all day long. I know you talk about self-hatred and self-criticism not being useful. Is there a way you advise to cope with being so much more aware of better options even when a person continues to default to bad habits?

A. Yes, if you simply spend a few more moments each day being more conscious and doing anything better, you're moving in the right direction. Change is simply not a microwave process.

San Diego Navy College Office among final four to close

Naval Education and Training Command (NETC) announced that the remaining four Navy College Offices (NCO) in the continental United States will close as scheduled on Oct. 1.

Sixteen NCOs closed a year ago, with the modernization of the Navy College Virtual Education Center (NCVEC), which now serves as the Navy College Program's (NCP) central location for tuition assistance processing and education services. The initiative is part of an ongoing effort to increase virtual and self-service options for Sailors.

The four NCOs closing at fleet concentration areas in Norfolk; San Diego; Jacksonville, Florida; and Kitsap, Washington operated for the past year during the transition. Eleven overseas NCOs will continue to remain open in Atsugi, Japan; Guam; Misawa, Japan; Sasebo, Japan; Yokosuka, Japan; Bahrain; Guantanamo Bay, Cuba; Rota, Spain; Sigonella, Sicily; Naples, Italy; and Pearl Harbor.

"Many of today's Sailors have grown up with online tools and are very tech savvy," said Rear Adm. Kyle Cozad, commander, NETC. "This initiative is an example of how we're striving to better provide education services to our Sailors when they choose, wherever they are and with the resources they need at their fingertips, instead of requiring folks to schedule appointments, get off work, jump in the car to accomplish everything that we've demonstrated Sailors can do on a personal device today.'

Since Oct. 1, 2016, the NCVEC has fielded more than 300,000 phone calls, help requests, e-tickets, web chats, tuition assistance requests and more.

Part of the NCVEC's new service delivery model has improved the Web Tuition Assistance (TA) approval process. The new process automatically checks/validates:

*the academic institution's course/tuition information.

*validates a Sailor's status, including degree plan,

*counseling,

*no missing grades,

*expiration of active obligated service (EAOS) status.

*TA annual usage, etc.

Through the NCVEC, education counselors are available to answer questions about all Navy College voluntary education programs and provide counseling services to Navy service members stationed throughout the world. The hours of operation are Monday-Friday, 7a.m. to 7 p.m. in the Eastern time zone

Options for Sailors through the Assistance Center online at www.navycollege.navy.mil include:

*submitting a help request,

*scheduling an appointment using the NCP Counselors Appointment Scheduler,

*chatting with a counselor though the Assistance Center by clicking the "Chat Now" button and

*searching frequently asked questions and topics.

Sailors may call the NCVEC at 877-838-1659 during hours of operation.NCVEC tools can also be accessed through the NCP app, available to download for free through the Google Play and iTunes stores.

Hurtful emotions are the connection to understanding self-harm

People deal with difficult feelings in all sorts of ways. They may talk with friends, go work out, or listen to music. But some people may feel an urge to hurt themselves when distressed. Harming or thinking about harming yourself doesn't mean you have a mental disorder. But it is an unhealthy way to cope with strong feelings. Finding new ways to cope can help you get through difficult times.

Some unhealthy ways people may try to relieve emotional pain include cutting, burning, or hitting themselves. These behaviors can be difficult to detect. People usually keep them a secret. Wounds can often be treated at home and covered with clothing or jewelry.

"The largest percentage of people who engage in non-suicidal self-injuring behaviors are teenagers," says Dr. Jennifer Muehlenkamp, an NIH-funded psychologist at the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire. Around 2 out of 10 teens and college-aged students report trying this behavior at least once.

Those are the key ages because youths are changing environments, Muehlenkamp explains. "Transitioning into college or from junior high into high school creates a lot of potential change. You lose the familiarity of your social group, and your social support might shift. There's a lot of new stress and pressures."

People who are anxious, are

depressed, or have an eating disorder are also more likely to turn to self-injuring behaviors. So are those in sexual minority groups who experience discrimination and bullying, such as those who identify as gay, lesbian, bisexual, or transsexual.

"Self-injury is a sign that someone is struggling," says Muehlenkamp. "Many youths transition out of it. But those who engage in it more repetitively and chronically may benefit from a direct clinical intervention."

If you're a parent or caregiver who's concerned, look for frequent unexplained injuries and clues like bandages in trash cans. Watch to see if the person wears appropriate clothing for the

weather. Someone who is selfharming may wear long pants or sleeves to cover their injuries, even when it's hot.

"The way most people find out is the person who is self-injuring will disclose it," Muehlenkamp says. They often tell a friend or a sibling first.

If someone confides in you, "your first reaction is essential to whether or not they will seek help," Muehlenkamp explains. "Be as nonreactive and nonjudgmental as possible."

Not everyone who self-injures is suicidal. But the only way to know is to ask. If they express any suicidal thinking, get them connected with a mental health provider. You can also call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at 1-800-273-TALK (8255) for advice.

Parents can open conversations with their kids by asking them if they've heard of self-harming behaviors or if they know friends who do it. If a friend has confided in them, they can offer to go talk to a trusted adult with their friend to get them help.

There are no medications for treating self-injuring behaviors.

But some medications can help treat mental disorders that the person may be dealing with, like depression or anxiety. Mental health counseling or therapy can also help you learn new ways to cope with emotion. See the Wise Choices box for tips on handling strong emotion.

There's no right or wrong way to deal with intense emotions. If you're feeling distressed:

•Talk with friends.

•Watch a funny movie or read a

comforting book.
•Listen to music.

 Get active. Go for a walk or get some exercise.

Distract yourself with any activity or helphy you love

ity or hobby you love.
•Avoid smoking, drinking, and other risky behaviors.

•Take care of your body. Eat and drink well. Get enough sleep. Realize it's okay to cry it out.

It is recommended customers check with local civilian or military post offices for information regarding size restrictions and customs declaration form requirements. Customers are advised mailing restrictions apply and some items cannot be mailed. Examples of non-mailable items are: alcohol, switchblade knives, pornography, controlled substances, and explosive or incendiary devices. If in doubt, contact your local civilian or military post office.

As a final note, customers should ensure articles are packaged properly for mailing and packages do not display markings related to any type of hazardous material, such as bleach, alcohol, or cleaning fluids. Parcels found by U.S. Postal Service with such markings or labels on the outside of the box will not be processed.

Boxer passes medical assessment ahead of schedule

San DIEGO - Sailors aboard USS Boxer passed the Fleet Support Operations-Medical 1.3 assessment with an

overall score of 96 recently.

FSO-M, typically held every 36 months, is a Commander, Naval Surface Forces-mandated inspection in which Afloat Training Group (ATG) Pacific evalu-

ates the crew's performance in simulated medical casualties, stretcher-bearer drills, battle dressing station (BDS) operations and a mass casualty drill.

Due to *Boxer*'s stellar performance, the ship's crew completed the evaluations ahead of schedule, and will not be required to complete FSO-M 1.4, the remediation inspection.

"Surface warfare is a team sport. Every problem or certification on this ship is a *Boxer* problem. In light of the recent tragedies, that strikes home with this crew, and they responded accordingly and together," said Capt. Benjamin Allbritton, *Boxer*'s commanding officer.

Unlike other medical assessments, FSO-M tests the ship's crew rather than just the medical department. Every department aboard *Boxer* was tested individually and was required to apply their level of medical knowledge while working together to render medical aid during simulated casualty scenarios.

"We're also assessed on our management of our occupational health programs such as heat and hearing," said Lt. Cmdr. Dana Lilli, *Boxer*'s senior medical officer. "FSO-M certification has been a huge success on *Boxer* due to excellent command involvement, attention to high priority and training the crew to respond to medical casualties. The knowledge displayed this week needs to be retained throughout the rest of the training cycle until it

is time to get tested again."

According to Senior Chief Hospital Corpsman Matthew Bauer, *Boxer*'s independent duty corpsman and medical department's leading chief petty officer, ATG inspectors said approximately one-third of San Diego-based ships score high enough in all sections of FSO-M to avoid FSO-M 1.4, with the average fleet-wide score being in the mid-eighties.

To prepare for FSO-M, Sailors assigned to *Boxer*'s medical department invested time and energy training the crew to increase first aid proficiency.

"Every department being medically knowledgeable is important because in emergencies, Sailors who aren't corpsmen need to be the first responders," said Hospital Corpsman 2nd Class Joshua Reuss. "We prepared the crew for this week's inspections with stretcher bearer training, mass casualty drills, training with every department on the ship on the 11 basic wounds, duty section training, heat stress training and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR)."

Marine Corps graduates first female AAV officer

QUANTICO, Va. - Second Lt. Mariah A. Klenke graduated from Assault Amphibian Officer Course Oct. 3 and is the first female Marine Corps officer to earn the military occupational specialty of 1803, Assault Amphibian Officer

Assault Amphibian Officer Course, which takes place aboard Camp Pendleton, prepares Marine officers to serve as Assault Amphibian Vehicle platoon commanders, and employ their Marines and vehicles. The 12-week course began in July and will graduate seven Assault Amphibian Officers.

"Assault Amphibian Officer Course was a great experience, and everyone worked well together," said Klenke. "I chose the 1803 MOS for the role it plays in Marine Corps' amphibious mission, the occupation's close community and the opportunity to work closely with the infantry. I am looking forward to mov-







Platform simplifies ammo management

CAMP PENDLETON - This summer, a team at Marine Corps Systems Command launched an upgrade to its ground ammunition inventory system, allowing for greater collection, storage and interchange of data. The enhancements to the Ordnance Information System - Marine Corps, or OIS-MC, also ensure audit readiness to meet federal standards.

The ammunition program team at MCSC maintains accurate inventory of all Marine Corps ammunition, and ensures Marines are always ready for the fight with the right ammo at the right time. "This platform provides seamless integration of data between all of the military branches," said Scott Rideout, program manager for ammunition at MCSC. "We're using more complex accounting principles, and this real-time processing of data helps reduce errors and accurately evaluate our inventory.'

This month, the team is using the platform to report a mandated audit to the federal government and work to achieve Financial Improvement and Audit Readiness (also known as FIAR). FIAR helps federal organizations compile successful financial statement audits by using the methods of financial statement auditors. Following the FIAR method maximizes the potential for accuracy to meet govern-

ment standards by defining key tasks, underlying detailed activities and resulting work products that all reporting entities should follow to become audit ready

"The DoD standard for reporting ammunition is you have to be 95 percent accurate," said Dennis Zarnesky, director of Inventory Control Point. "It's extremely important that our reporting is thorough because the more accurate we are, the more efficient our process is and the better business decisions we make. That's what audit readiness is all about.'

ICP, which falls under the ammunition program within MCSC's Logistics Combat Element Systems, consists of Inventory Management and Systems; and Plans, Analysis, and Evaluation. Both branches work together to record everything in the Corps' inventory, including items that are consumed, shot or disposed, such as small arms, mortars, artillery, rockets and missiles. Thanks to OIS-MC technology, recording inventory is easier.

"We're a small group of civilians, Marines and retired military, including retired ammunition Marines, who take this job seriously and have an incredible sense of commitment and ownership." said Zarnesky.

Energy action Mission success for **Energy Action Month**

WASHINGTON - Since 2012, October has been designated Energy Action Month, a celebration of energy as a pillar of the nation's economy and a time to recognize the role individual Americans can play in reducing energy waste.

The Department of the Navy's Energy Action Month theme for this year is, "Energy Action = Mission Success. The theme makes the point that energy is integral to the sea service's ability to maintain forward presence at sea, operate sensors that detect threats and help protect our forces, and conduct the full range of missions from humanitarian assistance/disaster relief (HADR) to high-end combat operations.

"The decisions Sailors and civilians make about energy use on a daily basis can have a direct impact on how far we steam, how often we refuel, and how long can we stay in the fight," said CAPT Carl Lahti, director of the Chief of Naval Operations Energy and Environmental Readiness Division.

"Energy Action Month reminds us of that responsibility and can help us focus on ways to improve our energy consumption."


The Department of Defense (DoD) is the largest single consumer of energy in the United States. The Navy accounts for over one quarter of DoD's petroleum use.

Throughout the month of October, the Navy is demonstrating its commitment to energy resiliency through awareness and outreach campaigns. Electronic and hard copy posters highlighting the theme are circulating Fleet-wide, and Navy social media channels will feature stories, videos, and tips for energy conservation afloat and ashore.

All U.S. Navy vessels depend on hull coatings and regular hull cleanings to reduce drag from buildup that would otherwise degrade hydrodynamics and miles per gallon at sea, affecting speed and range.

While ships equipped with technologies such energy dashboards, LED lighting, and hybrid propulsion systems like USS Makin Island (LHD 8) and USS America (LHA 6) have more "tools in the toolkit" to actively manage their energy consumption, each Navy ship can employ best practices such as turning off lights in unused spaces, using trail shaft (i.e., one or more engines secured) when operationally safe to do so, and completing routine maintenance on shipboard systems to get the maximum combat capability from the fuel in their tanks.



Charges filed against businesses targeting active military families

SAN DIEGO - California Attorney General Xavier Becerra announced criminal charges against Ramil Abalkhad, owner of Romano's Jewelers, and Melina Abalkhad, owner of MBNB Financial, Inc., for conspiracy to engage in illegal financing and debt collection practices.

Romano's Jewelers had several retail locations in California, including stores near Camp Pendleton. The Abalkhads targeted young Marines and Sailors, encouraging the purchase of jewelry using MBNB Financial for credit. According to the criminal complaint, Abalkhad failed to provide legally required disclosures about monthly payments, interest rates, or others terms of financing. Those customers who fell behind on their payments were allegedly harassed by the defendants' debt collectors. In addition, the defendants posed as an attorney, threatening servicemembers with court martial and other military disciplinary actions.

"Our servicemembers and military families sacrifice immensely for our country, the last thing they should have to worry about is being fleeced by local merchants," said Becerra. "At the Department of Justice, we will vigorously protect California's servicemembers and veterans, like all consumers in California. We'll continue working with our military partners who provide legal assistance and financial counseling to

educate and protect military consumers."

The California Department of Justice filed a 14-count felony complaint that charges the defendants with conspiracy to violate the Unruh Act, which protects consumers who buy goods or services on credit, and the Rosenthal Fair Debt Collection Practices Act, which protects Californians against unlawful debt collection practices.

Ramil Abalkhad was additionally charged with engaging in a check kiting scheme involving Romano's Jewelers bank accounts that resulted in a loss of \$270,000 to First Bank.

A third defendant, MBNB employee Ramiro Salinas, was also charged with conspiracy to engage in unlawful debt collection.

Ramil and Melina Abalkhad were arrested on September 26, 2017, and bail was set at \$235,000 and \$40,000, respectively. Salinas was arrested on September 29, 2017, and bail was set at \$100,000.

It's important to note that a criminal complaint contains charges that must be proven in a court of law. Every defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty.

Marine Corps General, Special Court-Martial dispositions

At a Special Court-Martial at Camp Pendleton, Gunnery Sergeant J. E. Perez was convicted by a military judge of wire fraud. The military judge sentenced the accused to 70 days confinement, reduction to E-5, and forfeiture of \$1,000 per month for two months. Pursuant to a pre-trial agreement, the convening authority agreed to suspend all confinement in excess of 60 days.

At a Special Court-Martial at Camp Pendleton, Lance Corporal Z. C. Hood was convicted by a panel of officer and enlisted members of wrongful destruction of government property, wrongful destruction of the property of another, larceny, and extortion. The members sentenced the accused to reduction to E-1 and a bad conduct discharge.

At a General Court-Martial at Camp Pendleton, Lance Corporal C. T. Pena was convicted by a military judge of assault, animal abuse, and violating a lawful general order. The military judge sentenced the accused to 6 years confinement, reduction to E-1, and a dishonorable discharge.

At a General Court-Martial at Camp Pendleton, Corporal J. W. Kmiecik was convicted by a military judge of violating a lawful general order, wrongful possession of a controlled substance, and wrongful use of a controlled substance. The military judge sentenced the accused to 15 months confinement, reduction to E-1, and a bad conduct discharge. Pursuant to a pre-trial agreement, the convening authority agreed to suspend all confinement in excess of 12 months.

At a Special Court-Martial at Camp Pendleton, Corporal W. G. Albertson was convicted by a military judge of violating a lawful general order and assault. The military judge sentenced the accused to 14 days restriction and reduction to E-2.



AutoMatters & More: Mustangs by the Bay 2017

'Mustangs by the Bay' is more than just another car club show. It is an opportunity to spend a Sunday in beautiful Embarcadero Marina Park North in San Diego. This is a place where people from around the world come for their

In the background, yachts are docked in front of the San Diego Convention Center, and on one end is Seaport Village with its many quaint shops, a wide variety of restaurants and talented buskers - who entertained on this particular day with a mix of music, performance art and more.

The show was limited to 350 entries - mostly Ford Mustangs. They were displayed, according to their classes, on the gently rolling, green grass slopes of the park.

As in years past, the show was a fund raising benefit for the Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 1774's annual toy drive for local, needy, military families, as well as for other local charities.

The weather was picture-perfect, as it most always is in San Diego. Wispy white clouds floated against the background of a vibrant blue sky, above green grass and the Pacific Ocean. We are so spoiled in San Diego.

Many participants spent much of their day relaxing on lawn chairs and chatting with friends – old and new. Others applied final cleaning touches to their cars in advance of the judges' critical visits.

Some strolled over to nearby Seaport Village, repeatedly pausing along the way to photograph cars, before arriving at their destination and exploring the fascinating shops - including the kite shop with its bright, multi-colored kites and lawn decorations.

Before returning to the car show to check out the vendors' exhibits, to see if we had won any of the many raffle prizes and for the awards presentation, it was tempting to eat lunch at Seaport Village. My personal lunchtime favorite is the marinated and flame-broiled Grecian chicken breast sandwich, served as a wrap on pita bread, at the Greek Islands Café (celebrating 37 years in business).

Fortunately the stubborn shipboard blaze that had started on Friday in a ship that was docked

near Seaport Village had finally begun to subside. The once raging flames and black smoke that had been seen on Friday were no longer visible. Nevertheless, a San Diego Harbor Police fireboat was still pumping water from a powerful water cannon against the side of the destroyed vessel in order to cool it down. The tremendous heat had transformed its superstructure into an eerily twisted mass of wreckage, in time for Halloween.

Back at the car show, one of the most rare Ford factory built Mustangs was a brand new 2012, race ready, 5.4 L Super Cobra Jet FR500CJ drag race Mustang (#25 of 50). This \$100,000, 2012 Mustang was so new that it still had its little sheet of clear plastic covering the Mustang emblem on the center of its steering wheel. Its tires (drag racer skinny at the front and super wide slicks at the rear) had likely never seen duty on a drag race track and, since the car is not street legal, it has probably never been driven except for on and off of transporters. However its owner did treat us to the glorious sounds of its engine.

Other than the Mustangs, cool cars included Cobras, Panteras, a gorgeous 1955 Ford Crown Victoria (two-tone Regency Purple and Snowshoe White original factory color) and a 1947 Willys Jeep CJ2A with a trailer.

There were classes for Stock and Modified Mustangs, as well as classes for other makes. Stock

is a mostly stock, mildly personalized class, whereas Modified encompasses cars with more significant alterations to their interior, exterior and performance.

While I did not win an award for my low mileage, 2011 Mustang GT 5.0 (white with red leather, six-speed manual transmission and high performance 3.73 rear end ratio), I did win one of the raffle prizes: Steve Magnante's new book entitled "1001 Mustang Facts," covering all six generations of Mustangs. Did you know that the 2005 Mustangs were the first ones built that did not share their platform with another Ford model?

MY PET WORLD:

Why dogs greet you with toys in their mouths

Dear Cathy, I have a two-year-old spayed female cocker spaniel named Roxy. She is a wonderful dog. Whenever anyone comes to the house, including myself, she picks up one of her stuffed toys and runs over to whoever came in with it in her mouth. She gets very excited and her tail wags. I think that she wants to play or is just showing she is happy, but she doesn't give up the toy. She just holds it in her mouth and runs away if we try to take it and play with her. Any idea why she would be doing this? I've only had her for four months, so I don't know if this is something she has always done. - Nancy F., Shirley, NY

Dear Nancy.

Many dogs greet people to their homes by grabbing a toy and wiggling their hips - and it's adorable! Roxy is definitely happy to see you and your guests. While she may want to play, she more than likely just wants to show off her "prey." In any case, just let Roxy bring her toys to guests, since this is her preferred way to greet people. Don't try to take the toys from her mouth and don't try to play with her at that time. Just let her walk around happily with her toy.

When it comes to playing fetch, however, or keeping her from putting something dangerous in her mouth, you need to teach her to how to "drop it." Do this training when no company is around. It's easy to do, especially if Roxy is food motivated.

When she brings you her toy, don't try to grab it from her mouth as this sets up a push and pull dynamic that you won't win. Instead, be ready with some hot dog pieces. She will be able to smell these treats in your hands. Tell her to "drop it." When she drops the toy, click if you have a clicker to mark the behavior (or use a marker word like bingo" if you don't have a clicker), and then give her a treat. Throw the toy for her to fetch. When she returns, repeat the steps.

It may take a few training sessions, but eventually she will drop the toy the moment you say, "drop it." Then no matter when you need her to drop the toy, she will do it for you.

Dear Cathy,

Your suggestions to James C. in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., who was having problems bonding with his daughter's dog, were good ones, including bringing a special toy for the dog and helping walk or feed the dog while visiting. I also found avoiding eye contact with my in-laws' dog helped tremendously. The dog was intimidated by my presence, but avoiding eye contact minimized that problem. Shortly after, the dog laid down near me on the couch, gave me a few kisses on the hand, and let me pet her while she fell asleep. I think if James tries this method, he just may achieve the results he's seeking. - Howard R., Hermosa Beach, CA

Dear Howard,

While I advised James to just be present and not engage the dog until the dog was ready to come around, I checked and I didn't tell him to avoid eye contact, which is good advice when meeting any new dog. Personally, I don't engage a dog unless a dog engages me. People think that's odd since I work in the animal world, but I think it's a respectful way to gain the trust of our animal friends.

Update on hurricane foster care question

Last week, Paul and DeAnne from Wisconsin offered to foster a pet for pet families who need help in the aftermath of our nation's recent hurricanes. At the time, I didn't know of any services other than the foster care services coordinated by local shelters in the affected regions.

This past week, however, I received news that Adopt-a-Pet.com, a nonprofit pet adoption website supported by the Petco Foundation, launched a website called www.FosteraHurricanePet.org. The website allows people with pets who live in the affected regions to find people elsewhere in the country who many want to foster their pet until they can get back on their feet.
